- The following proposed rule changes for PART THREE of the USMS Rules have been submitted to the Chairman of the Long Distance Committee, in a timely fashion. Any other proposed changes must be introduced as outlined in PART SIX.
- LD1) The use of the word "swimming" is superfluous in many of ut's references throughout PART THREE. RATIONAL: Housekeeping. SUBMITTED BY: LD Committee, RC.
- **301.1. ORGANIZATION** The conduct and organization of Long Distance Swimming for Masters shall be governed exclusively by the USMS through its Long Distance Swimming Committee and LMSCs. The Chairman and committee members shall be appointed as provided in Article 506.2.9.

LD2) Move the liability release from under the heading of SAFETY PRECAUTIONS (303.2) into the heading for REGISTRATION AND SANCTIONS (301.1). RATIONAL: Move the liability verbiage into the sanction area (as it is for pool events), since it is a condition of a sanction that the meet entry contain this language. SUBMITTED BY: Dick Monahan, Metropolitan

301.1.3 303.2. LIABILITY RELEASE - An acknowledgement and release shall be included on each entry form and be signed by each participant prior to participation. The wording shall be as specified in Article 201.1.2B. The wording, "In addition, I specifically acknowledge that I am aware of all the risks inherent in open water swimming and agree to assume those risks," shall be included in all open water event acknowledgement and release forms.

LD3) Add 302.2.5.D to postal events, to give a meet director the right to request additional information to verify and/or reject a postal swim entry which appears to contain erroneous information. RATIONAL: This codifies the right to question and reject erroneous or fraudulent postal entries.

SUBMITTED BY: LD Committee, RC.

**302.2.5.D** The Meet Director shall have the discretion to request additional verification of completion from any entrant, and may refuse to accept any entry that appears to contain erroneous information.

LD4) Change the relay team definition, so that an equal number of males and females are required. RATIONAL: Remove the bias toward male dominated mixed relays. SUBMITTED BY: LD Committee, RT.

302.2.6.D Mixed sex teams may be entered, provided there are an equal number of scoring males and females. at least one-swimmer of each-sex is represented as follows:

LD5) Change 303.2.7 Relays to allow exchanges in pool relays without physical contact between swimmers. RATIONAL: Allow dive starts and in-the-water push offs in pool relay events, similar to other pool relays.

SUBMITTED BY: LD Committee, RC.

303.2.7 Relays - ..... In the exchange in <u>open water events</u>, physical contact must be made between the two swimmers. <u>In pool events, the exchange is implied when the swimmer touches the wall or breaks the plane of the wall, within his lane</u>.

LD6) Change 304.3.3 to codify the referees right to suspend or cancel an event. RATIONAL: This change identifies that an event can be delayed or canceled and by whom, in the event of unsafe swimming conditions (temperature, tide, sharks,...) SUBMITTED BY: LD Committee, RC.

304.3.3 Incomplete Race - The referee shall determine if start of a race is to postponed or canceled, or if a race in progress is to be stopped. If a race is stopped and swimmers are removed from the water for their safety, the referee shall determine if the race is to be restarted, canceled, or considered official.

LD7)Insert a new section 304.5, and renumber the existing 304.5 and 304.6. The new 304.5 introduces COSTUME requirements for non-championship events

RATIONAL: The lack of any non-championship costume regulations leads to confusion as to non-championship requirements (specifically the use of wet suits). SUBMITTED BY:

### .304.5 Costume

- .1 One cap, one suit, goggles, ear plugs, and grease will be allowed. The suit shall be made of a porous material.
- .2 Wet suits may be allowed or disallowed at the discretion of the meet director. As wet suits generally provide a competitive advantage, prizes must be awarded to non-wet suit competitors based on the results excluding wet suit competitors. Duplicate prizes to wet suit competitors, if any, should be based on the overall results including all competitors. Any published results or records must clearly indicate which swimmers wore wet suits.
- .3 Apart from 304.5.2, flotation aids and any devices used to maintain body heat are not allowed.
- .4 Propulsive devices are not permitted.

LD8) Change 305.2.2 Championship team events to increase the number of team members from 3 to 4, add mixed teams, and change the age groups to the sum of the ages.

RATIONAL: Establish equality between the sexes, and encourage more club swimmers to compete as members of relays.

SUBMITTED BY: Bill Earley, San Diego-Imperial

- .2 Team events (as defined in Article 302.2.6).
  - A <u>Four</u> Three person team events shall be recognized in the Quarter-mile Straightaway (2 mile) and Postal One Hour.
  - B Men's and Women's and Mixed (two male and two female) Team events shall be recognized in the following age groups (the aggregate age of the four relay team members shall determine the age group): 76+, 100+, 120+, 160+, 200+, 240+, 280+, and 320+, 19+, 25+, 35+, 46+, 65+, 65+, 75+, and 85+ as determined by the age of the youngest swimmer.

- LD9) Remove verbiage from 305.3 which is also in 305.3.4. RATIONAL: Housekeeping SUBMITTED BY: LD Committee, RC.
- 305.3. SITE SELECTION -National Championship Meets-shall be awarded using the three area system as set-forth in Article 205.4.
- LD10) Change 305.3 site selection, to better define the bidding and site selection process RATIONAL: These changes better identify what a group must do in order to bid for a championship event SUBMITTED BY: LD Committee, RC
- .1 Bids shall be due, in writing, to the Long Distance Chairman, at or before the first Long Distance Committee meeting of the annual meeting.
- .2 Championships shall be awarded by the Long Distance Committee at the annual meeting.
- .3 Events not awarded at the annual meeting shall be awarded by the USMS Long Distance Chairman.
- .4 The following area award system will be followed for the bidding of USMS Long Distance Swimming Championships. Bids will be received up to two years in advance of the year bid. If no <u>suitable bids</u> <u>are bid-is</u> received from a qualifying area, <u>bidding will be opened to all areas</u>. bide-will be received from any area. Area definitions will follow Article 205.4.
- LD11) Change 305.4.2 championship entry forms, to make it the responsibility of the Long Distance Chairman to distribute meet entries to the LMSC's..
   RATIONAL: To clarify that it is the responsibility of the Long Distance Chairman to distribute Long Distance championship meet entry forms to the LMSCs.
   SUBMITTED BY: Dick Monahan, Metropolitan
- .2 Entry Forms Entry forms shall be reviewed by the USMS Long Distance Swimming Committee Chairman and the LMSC for content and sanctioning prior to distribution. Approved entry sheets shall be sent to the USMS Long Distance Swimming Chairman, who shall then send them to all LMSCs, and the USMS National Office at least ninety (90) days prior to the first day of the meet.
- LD12) Change 306.1 All-American recognition to allow swimmers to get recognition while swimming in non-championship, sanctioned events that are not effected by course length or conditions (pool and cable events).

RATIONAL: To bring long distance All-American recognition in line with pool swimmers, where the parameters of the swim can be accurately defined. And, allow more swimmers to compete for All-American status and increase the interest in supporting participation in these events. SUBMITTED BY: LD Committee, RC.

.306.1. ALL-AMERICAN RECOGNITION - The registered USMS swimmer with the fastest time (or greatest distance) for an individual event, at a contested national championship distance, for that season shall be declared the All-American in that event for that year. Because of differences in course, currents and other physical factors, All-American recognition in national championship open water events will be awarded based solely upon the results of the championship event. The national champion-in each age group of each individual national championship long distance swimming event shall qualify as a member of the USMS All American Long Distance Swimming team for the calendar year-in which the event was conducted.

Since 1990 is an even-numbered year, proposals to amend the Preamble: Goals and Objectives; Glossary: Articles 201, 202 and 203.1; Farts Four, Five and Six; and Appendix D (LMSC Abbreviations and Boundaries) come under Emergency legislation (601.1.4), and will require a nine-tenths vote of approval by the House of Delegates.

### L - 1 GLOSSARY - Zone (p. 12) - by Pacific

....There are seven <u>nine</u> zones divided as follows: (All but Oceana remain the same) OCEANA - Alaska, Gentral <del>California, Hawaii.</del> Inland Empire, Oregon, <del>Pacific,</del> Pacific Northwest, San Diego--Imperial, Snake River, Southern Pacific.

PACIFIC - Central California and Pacific

SOUTHERN PACIFIC RIM - Hawaii, San Diego-Imperial, Southern Pacific

Note: Zone alignment shall be reviewed each ten years as may be necessary, based upon the number of registered swimmers in each zone.

NOTE: appropriate changes are recommended in 506.2.8 - Legislation Committee, 506.2.15 - Rules Committee.

Rationale - Oceana Zone has a disproportionately small representation in the management of USMS for the large proportion of total registered members. LMSCs within the current Oceana Zone can be better served by smaller, more geographically centered Zones. The proposed changes would improve, not distort, the balance we seek in our unicameral House of Delegates.

### L = 2 ADD DEFINITION: <u>MAY NOT - mandatory prohibition or equivalent to SHALL NOT</u>

Rationale: to emphasize the mandatory nature of the expression

## L - 3 ARTICLES 201, 202, and 203. (p.42 - 45) by PNA

Move all of Article 201: Athlete Registration and Representation, Article 202: Sanction/Approval, and Article 203: Competition Outside the United States - to Part Five as Articles 502, 503, and 504, and renumber the rest of Part Five.

Housekeeping: make appropriate deletions in 506.2.8: 601.1.1: \*601:1:2: 601.2.1: and 601.2.2 to reflect the above.

Rationale: Committee jurisdiction would be easier to follow if listed as whole Parts of the Code.

### L - 4 201.1 MEMBERSHIP OF ATHLETES. (p. 42) - by Pacific

All swimmers competing in events sanctioned by Masters swimming must be registered with USMS of their foreign nation's recognized Masters Swimming Governing Body.

Rationale: Housekeeping, but an omission that could lead to difficulty were a foreign swimmer to compete in a USMS competition without appropriate registration/travel permit.

### L = 5 201.1.1 REGISTRATION YEAR (p. 42) - by Pacific

Athlete registration is for the period November 1-through October 31 January 1 through December 31 of each year. Swimmers applying for registration on or after September 1 November 1 will be issued a registration card valid through October 31 December 31 of the following year.

Rationale: change the registration year to match the calendar year now used for insurance coverage, most taxation, budgetary and other administrative management. A longer period of time as a paid-up first time member would serve to encourage renewals.

L = 6 201.2.6 - REPRESENTATION (p. 43) - by Pacific There shall be <u>only</u> one registration per individual swimmer permitted at any one time.

Rationale: Housekeeping, to state clearly the intent.

# L = 7 506.2.1 - CHAMPIONSHIP COMMITTEE (p. 71) Add as second sentence: <u>At least two of the Committee shall not have experience in the Direction of National Championship Meets</u>

Rationale: To ensure the "customers'" viewpoint, un-influenced by the experience of National Championship Meet Directorship.

## L = 8 506.2.8 - LEGISLATION COMMITTEE (p. 73) - by Pacific

The Legislation Committee shall consist-of-a-Chairman appointed <u>Chairman shall be appointed</u> by the President for a two-year term. The Chairman shall choose from the House of Delegates fourteen <u>twelve</u> members, with two <u>at least one</u> members from each zone.

Rationale - to recognize proposed new Zone configuration, eliminate the previous difference in representation by zone, and retain the size of the Committee at a more workable number.

L = 9 506.2.9 - LONG DISTANCE COMMITTEE (p. 72) - by Pacific

The Long Distance Swimming Committee shall-consist-of-e-Chairman-appointed Chairman shall be appointed by the President for a two year term, plus one representative from each zone and three at-largemembers. The Chairman shall choose from the House of Delegates twelve members, with at least one member from each zone. The Chairman will be the USMS liaison to the USS long Distance Swimming Committee. The Long Distance Swimming Committee may initiate and shall consider proposed amendments to Part Three of the Code and shall present them to the House of Delegates with recommendations.

Rationale - see 506.2.8. Final sentence is housekeeping, since this authority is explicit in Section 601.1.3 and 601.4.

L = 10 506.2.12 - NOMINATING COMMITTEE (p. 74) by Metropolitan, PNA and Oregon The Nominating Committee shall be the Zone Committee. They will canvass qualified and interested persons and present to the House of Delegates a slate list containing not less than one qualified nominee for each Officer position at least one month before the Annual Meeting.

Rationale: To allow the Nominating Committee to nominate more than one person for an officer position, if the committee determines that more than one interested candidate is qualified.

L - 11 506.2.15 - RULES COMMITTEE (p. 74) - by Pacific ..... The Chairman shall choose from the House of Delegates ten twelve members with at least one member from each zone....

Rationale: see 506.2.8

 L = 12 506.2.15 (p. 74) add new section and renumber the remainder - by PNA <u>Rule Book Committee - The Rule Book Committee shall consist of a Chairman appointed by the President</u> for a two year term, as many members as necessary appointed by the Chairman to carry out the duties of the Committee, and a representative of the Championship,Legislation, Long Distance, Marketing and Rules <u>Committees</u>. The duties of the Committee are to edit and proofread the rule book, arrange publishing, select a cover design, and perform other duties necessary to complete the annual publication of the United States Masters Swimming Code of Regulations and Rules of Competition. Rationale: Rather than being a temporary job, publication of the USMS Rule Book is an on-going task requiring editing and proofreading each year, correct insertion of new rules and legislation in all sections affected, solicitation and communication with the printer during the year, and consideration of improvements to the book. The Committee should continue to function to maintain and/or increase the quality of the book.

L = 13 Appendix D - LMSC ABBREVIATIONS AND BOUNDARIES (p. 95) - by Connecticut LMSC Numeric-Godes-and Abbreviations GA <u>SP</u> Southern Pacific (all others remain the same)

> Rationale: delete all numeric codes, which are a holdover from old AAU Associations and no longer viable. Use only abbreviations.

The correction from "CA" to "SP" for Southern Pacific is housekeeping. Obvious alpha order, and authorized last year but not implemented.

L - 14 Appendix D - LMSC BOUNDARIES (p. 98) by Midwestern Midwestern - The State of Nebraska (except-the Gounty of Scottbluff)

Rationale: The exception is lost in antiquity - Scottsbluff County appears in no other LMSC boundary description.

.3 Area 3 - Area 3 shall be composed of the following LMSCs: Adirondack, Allegheny Mountain, Connecticut, Delaware Valley, Florida, Florida Gold Coast, Georgia, Indiana, Kentucky, Lake Erie, Maryland, Metropolitan, Michigan, New England, New Jersey, Niagara, North Carolina, Ohio, Potomac Valley, South Carolina, Southeastern, Virginia, and West Virginia.

#### Rationale.

Currently Area 2 (central) has fewer than 16% of all registered USMS swimmers, but has one third of the National Championships. By moving five LMSCs from area 1 to area 2 and five from area 3 to area 2, the number of swimmers in each area would be much better balanced. Since most national meets receive a significant portion of their attendance from swimmers within driving distance, it is important to distribute the national championship meets consistent with swimmer density to allow swimmers an equal opportunity to participate at National Championship meets.

The following table is based on 1989 registration and shows the effect of the proposed change.

All swimmers shall be eligible to enter all 50 yard (meter) events. The championship Committee may institute time standards for longer events if it deems necessary.

### Rationale

Currently the rules do not implement (or prohibit) time standards. This change allows the Championship committee to set time standards as well as a means of enforcing them. However, it still allows all swimmers an opportunity to swim four events at national championships. Adding the "slower" swimmers in the 50's does not significantly add time to the conduct of the meet. Any time standards will impact the younger swimmers the most (i.e. there are more of them and therefere more are likely to miss the standard). Since younger swimmers are generally faster, nearly all of the swimmers involved will be capable of swimming 50's in under one minute. Allowing one and one half minutes per heat, 40 heats can be conducted in one hour. This will accomodate a minimum of 320 "extra" swimmers in each course. This is offered as a compromise that keeps meet duration at an acceptable level and still allows all swimmers to participate.
